The men and women that work on the aircraft and get them ready to fly are called Maintainers, thus the name. The SMC is a good-sized room in one of the maintenance buildings that is stocked with water, Gatorade, coffee, and snacks. As volunteers we keep the fridges stocked, clean serving surfaces, bake cookies, make popcorn, and look for opportunities to engage the airmen in conversation. In those conversations, we strive to be discerning of where they are spiritually so that we can speak God's love into their lives. It is a fine line we tread so as not to be accused of proselytizing, but we ask God for discernment to look beneath the surface as we have the opportunity to engage in conversations.

Please know how grateful Dianne and I are for each of you that are part of our support team. We thank God for your faithful prayers for us as we love and care for the men and women at Luke AFB. Chaplain Hess (Wing Commander) has expressed that there has been an increase in suicide interventions at Luke recently.
