Dear friends, family, and ministry partners,

Fall is in full swing in Korea. We are experiencing cooler weather, rice harvesting is finished, fall flowers have bloomed and gone, and many Korean holidays indicate the change in season. While I (Jeff) will miss the summer, I am glad the bugs are gone (it is hard to ride a bike at night when you hit swarm after swarm of gnats you don't see). The summer was a challenging season for our family as we had many health issues, but we saw God working despite it. Thank you all for your faithful prayers for our health as our kids faced multiple surgeries and asthma-related issues, and then our whole family had COVID-19 (Candace and I still have lingering coughs).

Despite our health issues, God's ministry continues to move forward. The older boys started attending AWANA,

which has given me a chance to meet one-on-one with some Soldiers every Wednesday to disciple them. Our van was finally registered with the military, and we are now able to drive on post after an entire year of taxis and catching rides from others! I have continued serving on the church worship team, and we have built more relationships with the worship team members, especially with the leader and her husband.

Candace started attending the Protestant Women of the Chapel (PWOC) Bible studies again each Wednesday. It has given her more opportunities to engage with the military spouses here. Earlier this summer, she was published in a local magazine where she shared the challenges and joys of being a military wife (I'm a proud husband)! She has also been able to meet with several ladies one-on-one to disciple them and has more freedom to meet during the week since our driving access is available again. I started a men's weekly prayer breakfast and was invited to speak at a men's breakfast in October, where I taught on Galatians 5 for about two dozen men. We continue to meet every Friday and are still working our way through Luke (we are finally in Chapter 9). I prepare discussion questions to be used after each message, when I break everyone into groups to discuss the passage and try to apply it to our lives. This discussion time has led to so many great conversations, deep questions about God and life, and moments of vulnerability as people share hurts in their lives.

- For the Soldiers and families who cannot go home for the holidays, that they will find peace and joy this Christmas.
- We need long-term babysitters—it has been challenging to find consistent help.
- Pray that God would grow my men's prayer group. My desire is that we would have a large group praying for this community every week.

Please be in prayer for more consistent childcare workers; it has been a challenge for Candace to make the arrangements every week. There are also four infants in the group (including a set of twins), and more are expected as our Cadence missionary co-workers here are expecting their first child this winter! It is so great (and noisy) to see the kids running around like hooligans, laughing and screeching each week.

A couple of weeks ago, we held our second annual Reformation Day celebration and had several single Soldiers over, along with a good friend and her son. We ate a ton of

A new Soldier attended who has only been in Korea for a few months, and he was so happy to have a home-cooked meal for the first time in about a year (he just finished Basic and Advanced Individual Training).

We are looking forward to the holidays just around the corner and have several events planned for our community to spend time together. Thanksgiving, cookie decorating, and Christmas Day together will make for a busy but joyous schedule. While celebrating holidays can be really fun, many miss their loved ones back home, and it can be a very bittersweet time. Please pray for God's love, peace, and joy

to be felt by everyone who enters our home. We strive to welcome everyone, but some days, nothing beats being with your loved ones at home.
