I wanted to send you an update to share about people in my current ministry and also remind you all that there is a "remnant" of believing men and women who've returned back to the U.S. after their duty on the Korean peninsula who are still "running the race with endurance."



Alex is still here in Korea (for a short while yet), and we meet weekly. Alex is a history buff and loves recounting to us his studies in world and U.S. history. It won't be surprising if he ends up teaching history somewhere (if the students will tolerate his dad jokes). He has memorized more verses than anyone I've served thus far and never misses our weekly meetings.

Shay is back in Kansas and meets regularly with a couple who is discipling him, Frank and Ruth Ann Branham. He was so spiritually hungry when he was here. We only met for three months late in his tour, but he was always scribbling down notes and asking questions. I recently asked him what he was reading and he produced a short stack of three or four books, the first of which was RC Sproul's *The Holiness of God.* I'm sure Frank and Ruth Ann are enjoying having him in their house.



James P is pictured here with his children, and while we do not meet for a regular Bible study yet (not for his lack of interest but for logistical reasons), when we have coffee together our times are lengthy. We met for almost seven hours during our first meeting—and I had only one refill of coffee! He would appreciate prayer as he navigates the complexities and challenges of raising his children solo here.



Austin (pictured with his bride Kalene and daughter Lauralene) was at Camp Casey in 2015, then again at Camp Humphreys. He's always shown maturity in his role as an NCO and is now steeped in theology studies through Liberty University. His wife told me last evening how proud she is of the strides he has made since taking his role as a spiritual leader in their household seriously. I'm grateful that they are here for another year.
